






CBRNRISK MITIGATION IN WHAT CONTEXT DO WE WORK?

- There is a diverse spectrum of chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear (CBRN) risks and incidents
- Government bodies are each only mandated for a (small) part of the spectrum
- CBRN risks cannot be addressed in isolation (neither institutionally nor geographically)
- In recognition of the cross-border implications of CBRN risks, governments have signed up to regional and international agreements with obligations to meet
- Resources are limited...

... how to manage, prepare and coordinate in such a context?

EUROPEAN UNION CBRN RISK MITIGATION

CENTRES OF EXCELLENCE INITIATIVE (EU CBRN CoE)



EU-funded initiative to mitigate the risks related to CBRN materials. Launched in 2010 and jointly implemented by the European Union and the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute (UNICRI).

Creates a framework for coordination and cooperation at the national, regional and international level to enhance CBRN policies and capabilities. The EU funds projects that address common regional priorities.


All-hazards approach (safety and security):

- **criminal** (e.g. theft, sabotage, illicit trafficking and terrorism)
- **accidental** (e.g. industrial / laboratory accidents, waste management, transport incidents)
- natural (e.g. infectious disease outbreaks, CBRN releases caused by natural hazards)

THE EU CBRN CoE APPROACH

Establish a CBRN National Team

• Partner Countries appoint a focal point and establish an inter-agency CBRN National Team comprised of representatives from all government bodies addressing CBRN risks

Draft a CBRN National Action Plan (NAP)

• Partner Countries produce an action plan identifying national priorities for capacity building

Develop (regional) project proposals

• Partner Countries develop regional projects that are designed to address common regional needs. National projects are also developed, based on the CBRN National Action Plan

Share experiences in the region and beyond

• Partner Countries share experience and engage with regional and international partners

LESSONS LEARNT / SUCCESS FACTORS



 The human factor in the network makes all the difference – invest in focal points and key national experts and find 'champions' to mobilise support



 Developing an action plan is beneficial – first to get stakeholder buyin and then for internal resource allocation and to engage outside partners



 Awareness-raising amongst different target groups is essential – to get support from (and for) decision-makers, implementers, beneficiaries



 Promote learning and experience-sharing between peers – bring countries together to share how they overcame challenges or had successes
