Medical care The States Parties have recognised that “the provision of appropriate emergency and continuing medical care, or the lack of it, has a profound impact on the immediate and long-term recovery of mine victims.” ⁷	<i>What are the “availability and gaps in services and support, and existing or new requirements”⁸ as concerns medical care for landmine victims and others who have suffered injuries?</i>					
Physical rehabilitation The States Parties have recognised that physical rehabilitation is a crucial means to landmine victims’ ultimate aim and that it encompasses rehabilitation and physiotherapy services and the provision of prosthetic appliances and assistive devices. ⁹	<i>What are the “availability and gaps in services and support, and existing or new requirements”⁸ as concerns physical rehabilitation of landmine survivors and other persons with disabilities / others who have suffered injuries?</i>					
Psychological support The States Parties have recognized the importance of “activities that assist mine victims to overcome the psychological trauma of a landmine explosion and promote social well-being” and that “appropriate psycho-social support has the potential to make a significant difference in the lives of mine victims.” ¹⁰	<i>What are the “availability and gaps in services and support, and existing or new requirements”⁸ as concerns psychological support for landmine survivors and other victims, and other persons with disabilities / others who have suffered injuries?</i>					
Economic inclusion The States Parties have recognized the importance of efforts “that improve the economic status of mine survivors, and the families of those killed or injured, in affected communities through education, economic development of the community infrastructure and the creation of employment opportunities.” ¹¹	<i>What are the “availability and gaps in services and support, and existing or new requirements”⁸ as concerns participation in the economic sphere of communities on a basis equal to others?</i>
